Briefing document on climate change and Disability

Background

There is unequivocal evidence that climate change is happening, and that human activity is the principal cause. We know that all of humanity will be negatively affected unless we take radical action to change the way we live. However, Disabled people — an estimated 1 billion globally — face this threat compounded by discrimination, poverty, marginalization, and other pre-existing inequalities, making the threat to our lives even greater. It is therefore vital that our voices, ideas, and representations are heard and included, as world-wide solutions are developed and implemented.

The UK Government have even acknowledged that to date, very little work has explored issues around people with disabilities and resilience-building in the context of longer-term climatic and environmental change.

The UN also have acknowledged that people with disabilities are at increased risk of the adverse impacts of climate change – including threats to their health, food security, water, sanitation, and livelihood.

Current situation

Disabled people are frequently unable to leave their homes and reach safety in the event of evacuation due to environmental catastrophes, leading to the loss of many lives. Disabled people are twice as likely as any other group to die in disasters.

Pandemics strike Disabled individuals harder than anyone else due to long term health conditions including weakened immune systems, and unequal access to health care. Covid-19 is believed to be the first of many Pandemics which will sweep across the Globe as the climate changes.

Higher temperatures are more likely to affect people with disabilities or pre-existing conditions that limit the body's ability to stay cool. Medications that Disabled people rely on to manage their conditions can also interact negatively with the heat.

Environmental illnesses of many kinds are on the rise. Environmental Pollution is a major cause of ill health: creating childhood disability, impairing children's health, diminishing their capacity to learn, and reducing their life chances.

The obligation to respect, protect, and fulfil the human rights of persons with disabilities is not just a moral obligation. It is enshrined in international laws and frameworks:

- I. <u>United Nations Convention on Rights of Persons with Disabilities (UNCRPD)</u>
- II. Article 4 (3) and General Comment 7, by the Committee on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities, obliges all State Parties to actively involve and consult with persons with disabilities, through their representative organisations, in decision-making on matters that affect their lives (including climate change)
- III. Disability Inclusion in UK Climate Action 5
- IV. Article 9 obliges State parties to take measures to ensure that persons with disabilities have access, on an equal basis with others, to the following: - the physical environment; - transportation; - information and communications, including information and communications technologies and systems; - all other facilities and services, open or provided to the public, both in urban and in rural areas.
- Article 10 obliges State Parties to "take all necessary measures" to ensure the inherent right to life of persons with disabilities on an equal basis with others.
 Article 11 obliges all State Parties to take "all necessary measures to ensure the protection and safety of persons with disabilities in situations of risk, including humanitarian emergencies and the occurrence of natural disasters."
- Article 21 obliges all State Parties to provide information intended for the general public to persons with disabilities in accessible formats.
- Article 32 obliges all State Parties to ensure that international cooperation and development programming, including international cooperation on climate action, is inclusive of and accessible to persons with disabilities. As outlined in the Article, appropriate technical and economic assistance must be provided to enable this.

Solutions

1. Disabled people must be involved in all debates and in shaping solutions. Representatives from the global Disabled community must be at the table when environmental solutions are being developed and implemented.

2. The needs of Disabled people must be addressed in all climate change discussions and all environmental solutions must be designed to be accessible for us all.

3. All climate events must be designed to be accessible as possible considering all aspects of accessibility including sign language interpreters, access for wheelchair users and others with mobility and sensory impairments. There should be an option to join debates virtually.

Disabled people are currently excluded from discussions and solutions on climate change, meaning that laws, policies, and programmes don't consider the needs of Disabled people or the impact of proposed change. This is referred to as "Eco-ableism." "Eco-ableism" will only end when decision makers listen to and work with Disabled people.
